It was he who wrote the first official biography of the saint and, at the end of his life, he was also Bishop of the Diocese of Albano. Bonaventure wrote in one of his last



Again it is prophecy that is our theme this week. Here, we concentrate on the sending of prophets, the entrusting of the mission to them, and most importantly the necessary qualifications to be a prophet. The only qualification necessary is an open ear, to hear the mandate from God. We see this in Amos, the

simple shepherd, and in the Twelve, called by Jesus from their humble occupations, which no one would have thought qualified them to speak on 'religious' themes. As last week, the possibility of rejection and failure is quite explicitly treated -Jesus instructs the Apostles in what to do if they are ignored. When the Gospel simply states, "So they set off to preach repentance..." we can imagine all that was in their minds and hearts as they did so. They had heard the call of Jesus, and allowed it into their hearts: this was all they needed to go out and speak his words. "**He began to send them out.**"

letters: "I confess before God that the reason which made me most love the life of Blessed Francis is that it resembles the birth and development of the Church". These words refer us directly to this Sunday's Gospel which presents the first occasion on which Jesus sent the Twelve Apostles out on mission. Jesus "called to him the Twelve", St Mark recounts, "and began to send them out two by two.... He charged them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not put on two tunics". After his conversion Francis of Assisi practised this Gospel to the letter, becoming a very faithful witness of Jesus; and, uniquely bound to the mystery of the Cross, was then transformed into "another Christ", exactly as St Bonaventure describes him. Jesus Christ is the inspiring centre of St Bonaventure's entire life and likewise of his theology. We rediscover this centrality of Christ in the Second Reading of today's Mass, the famous hymn of St Paul's Letter to the Ephesians that begins: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places". The Apostle thus shows in the four passages, that all begin with the same words: "in him", with reference to Jesus, how this plan of blessing was brought about. "In him", the Father chose us before the creation of the world; "in him" we have redemption through his blood; "in him" we became his heirs, predestined to live "for the praise of his glory"; "in him" all those who believe in the Gospel receive the seal of the Holy Spirit. This Pauline hymn contains the vision of history which St Bonaventure helped to spread in the Church: the whole of history is centred on Christ, who also guarantees in every era new things and renewal. In Jesus, God said and gave all things, but since he is an inexhaustible treasure, the Holy Spirit never ceases to reveal and to actualize his mystery. So it is that the work of Christ and of the Church never regresses but always progresses.

Saint of the week

Saint Swithun—15th July



The life of St Swithun, an Anglo-Saxon bishop, is rich in legend. A century after his death in 863, he was chosen as patron saint for the Winchester Cathedral's Benedictine monastery. His bones, housed in a splendid reliquary, became famed for their healing powers. His cult lasted until the Reformation, when all traces of his shrine were swept away. The lovely story of St Swithun, the Cathedral's much-loved Saxon patron saint, combines a handful of hard facts with many legends. The facts are that around 800 he was born in Winchester , became counsellor to the Saxon kings Egbert and Ethelwulf, and was Bishop of Winchester for the last 10 years of

his life. When he died in 863, he was buried in front of the west door of the Saxon Old Minster – its outlines are traced in brick next to the Norman Cathedral. Here he rested for a 100 years. How did he become famous? When Aethelwold, the reforming Bishop of Winchester, set up a new community Benedictine monks at Old Minster around 964, he decided they needed a new, purpose-made patron saint. Bishop Swithun's bones were dug up and placed them in a precious reliquary inside the building, given by King Edgar – an act later seen as against the saint's wishes. In the 11th century, his relics were on the move again - this time, into the huge new Cathedral built by the Norman invaders. His Anglo-Saxon reliquary was carried with great ceremony to its new position behind the high altar, where it stayed until 1450. His tomb became a major site for pilgrims, many seeking to be healed from illness. A short tunnel called the Holy Hole, allowed them to crawl right under his shrine, as close as possible to his miraculous healing powers. In 1476, a new, even larger shrine was inaugurated at the far end of the building. It must have been a striking sight, festooned with gifts of silver, gold and jewels offered by grateful pilgrims.

What legends are told about him? One legend claims that Swithun tutored the young Alfred the Great. Another says is that he built the first stone bridge over the River Itchen that runs through Winchester. His most famous miracle tells of a simple act of human kindness to a poor woman. When she was crossing the bridge, she was jostled and dropped her basket of eggs. The saint took pity on her – and made her broken eggs whole. One source claims that when Swithun died, he asked to be buried out of doors 'where the feet of ordinary men could pass over him.' This, and the possible mistranslation of a medieval text, may have given rise to the story that when the saint's bones were moved inside the Old Minster on his feast day, 15th July 971, a terrible storm broke out, lasting for 40 days and nights. This is the basis of the popular belief that if it rains on 15th July, it will rain for 40 days. Sadly, this claim has no basis in fact.

What happened to his shrine? The cult of St Swithun and his shrine came to an abrupt end during the Reformation, when King Henry VIII seized control of the Catholic Church in England, and declared himself head of the English Church On 21 September 1538, under cover of darkness at 3am in the morning, the king's commissioners smashed the shrine apart, and stole all the valuables. Three years later, a workman stopped up the Holy Hole. Nothing now remains of his once great shrine today, but a modern memorial can now be seen that that marks the spot.

We fully appreciate that not everyone is eligible to join the Diocesan Gift Aid Donation Scheme but if you pay UK tax, we would ask that you please consider completing the simple form which would allow us to claim back the tax (which you have already paid) on any monies you give to St. Mary's. Of the **548**

people we have on the Parish Register, only **96** of those re-registered for Gift Aid when the new form was issued last year. Forms are available at the back of the Church and can be handed into the office or placed in any of the collection boxes.
