Luke 4:21-30

### Monstrance



The monstrance is the sacred vessel which contains the consecrated Host when it is exposed or carried in procession. The host is now called the Blessed Sacrament.

We believe Christ is truly present in the host. He is God with us. We receive the host in Holy Communion. It is wonderful to have God living among us.

### Vestments

This is a cincture. It is the belt the priest and deacon wear around their alb.

Altar Servers also wear them, they are gold or white in colour.



## St Paul's Letter

Today we hear about St Paul again writing to the Corinthians. When Paul arrived in Corinth in about 49AD he would have seen lots of ruins. The Romans had destroyed the city over 100 years before. The place Paul knew was a young city, being rebuilt.

Corinth was on the southern side of Greece and was full of people from different places, religions and, of course, culture.

In Jesus' time, Corinth was quite a

rich place because of the trade that was carried on there.

The Christian community that Paul started in Corinth were a mixture of all these peoples. Some were wealthy tradesmen, some were slaves or former slaves.

Paul stayed with them for 2 years and when he was away from them he wrote many letters to remind them how to behave.



## Letters

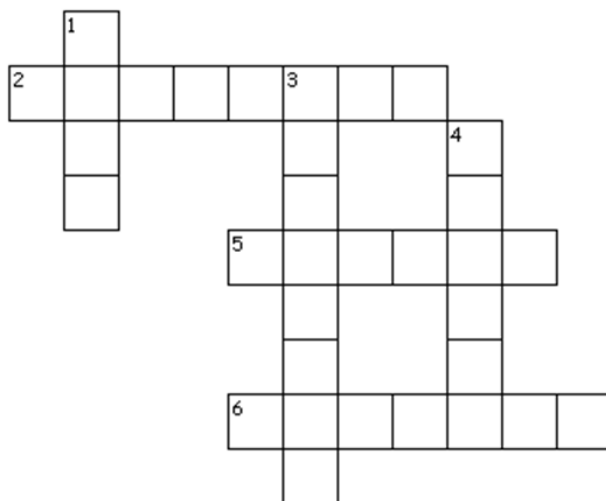
How do you feel when you get a letter? Not many people write them these days but it is always great to see that letter dropping on the mat.
